## Foreign Policy of China –IR, 820 (Elective Course)

Course Description: This course examines the foreign policy of the People's Republic of China within the context of contemporary international relations. Students will explore the evolution, principles, and strategies that shape China's interactions with the international community through a combination of historical analysis, theoretical frameworks, and case studies. The course begins with a historical overview of Chinese security policy, emphasizing key concepts of national identity, international status, and modernization. It explores the domestic sources of China's security policy, China's security relations in the Asia Pacific, and particular case studies of crisis diplomacy, such as the South China Sea, the Mekong River Delta, and the Himalayan-Tibetan Plateau.

<u>Course Objectives</u>: This course surveys China's rise and its implications for Asian and international security. It covers a wide range of topics, including China's strategic priorities, regional engagements, global economic strategies, security policies, and role in global governance institutions.

<u>Learning outcome</u>: Upon successful completion, students will have the knowledge and skills to:

- A comprehensive knowledge of the evolution of China's foreign relations and security policies.
- A critical understanding of the key drivers of Chinese security policy behavior in the Asia Pacific.
- Deeper insights into regional foreign policy and security challenges from a Chinese perspective.
- A developed capacity to present strong arguments in their written and oral work and to link relevant concepts and theories to actual practice skills (as developed through written assessments, in-class discussions, and tutorialbased activities).

Week 5:	Nationalism and public opinion: implications for China's external behavior
Week 6:	Evolution of strategic thought: Maoist era to contemporary developments
Week 7:	Military modernization and its implications for regional and global security
Week 8:	Relations with neighboring states: Southeast Asia, Japan, Korea, and Central Asia; South China Sea disputes and regional security dynamics
Week 9:	Midterm Exam

Week 11:	Evolution of Sino-American relations since the Cold War
