Political Economy & Economics of Defense

d. Course Description

To give information about basic principles of functioning, structure, and problem spots of the national economy part, which creates conditions for basic, satisfying societal needs such as protection of territorial integrity, state institutions, citizens, and property, is the main aim of the subject. Fundamentals of defense economics; definition of terms and concepts; the demand for military expenditures; costs versus benefits of defense expenditure; the opportunity cost of defense; the peace dividend; defense procurement theories; evidence and policies; the Greek defense industry; arms race models; the arms race cost for Greece; military manpower.

e. Course Objectives

Defense expenditure absorbs a considerable GDP share for many countries, shifting resources away from alternative, non-military activities. In this trade-off between national security and higher growth rates, one must determine the appropriate balance between the alternatives in various national and international constraints. This course aims to describe the reasoning under which such choices must be made and investigate the extent to which domestic military production may lead to corresponding import substitution, considering the impact of such a policy on the (economic) domestic and foreign sectors.
