d. Course Description

This course is planned to introduce the students to critical themes related to the politics of West Asia. This course intends to elucidate the complex contemporary politics of West Asia. It aims to equip students with in-depth knowledge relating to the politics of West Asia so that they can easily comprehend the causes and consequences of the contemporary security issues taking place in West Asia. This course aims to discuss the origin of the term "West Asia" and elucidate the specific characteristics and properties of the region known as West Asia. Moreover, this course also plans to discuss the impact of the demise of the Ottoman Empire and the formation of new states in this very region, the Saudi-Iran rivalry, the Security Dilemma persisting between different states in West Asia, the ideology of ISIS, the Iranian Revolution, causes and consequences of Arab Spring, Arab-Israel war, Rentier state theory, and regional security complex. This course also aims to critically evaluate the causes and consequences of several imperative contemporary phenomena, conflicts, and rivalries in this region. However, the foremost aim of this course is to enable the students to specifically comprehend the politics of West Asia and understand the security problems emerging in this region.
