GPA 425 Challenges to National Integration

Pre requisites: None

Course Description:

This course seeks to debate and define the notion of national integration which has

been integral to nation-building efforts in most of the developing countries after the

two World Wars. Perceived as a challenge to the cohesion of the new states,

particularly those societies that were diverse, multi-ethnic, multilingual and

multicultural in character, national integration was posited as the best way to develop

a strong sense of national identity that would counteract the influence of subnational

and centrifugal forces. By taking this course, the students would learn about different

processes of national integration, the difficulties faced in forging national integration.

Pakistan would be used as a case study of the failure in national integration.

Learning Objectives:

To develop a holistic understanding of the notion of national integration.

To expose and explain the tensions inherent in processes of state building

and nation building.

Contrast and compare challenges of national integration experienced by

mature democracies and transitional democracies.

To explore why national integration project in Pakistan failed.

Learning Outcomes:

After completing the course, students should be able to:

Learn about national integration as a state/societal project.

Learn about the role that language, ethnicity, geography, media, and religion

play in processes of national integration.

Learn about some of the key factors that caused the failure of national

integration in Pakistan.

• Learn about the role of state in the national integration project

Course contents:

Different dimensions of the concept of national integration; examine functional and

neo-functional theories of national integration, along with theories of modernization

and assimilation. It would pay special attention to the role of ethnic, linguistic and cultural factors in both impeding and enhancing processes of national integration. Role of religion and media would also be highlighted. It would also critically evaluate the tensions inherent in the state building and nation-building processes.
