GPA 426 Gender Studies

Pre requisites: None

Learning objectives:

This course focuses on the ways gender manifests itself in social, cultural, and political contexts. It seeks to explore some of the key theoretical debates linked to gender studies. It will examine the impact of gender categorization in creating complex interactions between gender, family, culture, sexuality and society. By taking this course, students will develop a critical understanding of gender related issues.

- Analyse the basic terms and concepts related to Gender Studies
- Identify and understand a variety of methods of studying gender as a social institution
- Develop a critical understanding of some of the key theoretical debates in historical and contemporary gender studies
- Explore dynamics of power relations in the lives of individuals, groups and cultures in multiple settings
