Details of Practice Hours

Students are required to complete 17 hours of practice conducting networking activities during the semester. Students need to visit different formal and informal educational and industrial organisations to establish the need of developing community networks, to initiate strategies and action plans for advocating the concept of collaborated work through developing community networks.

3. Learning outcomes

By end of the course, students will be able to:

 Critically explore the terms and the interrelated relationship between networking, partnership working and developing connections through alliances with reference to their practical exposure

- Evaluate the context in which community development networks are established and how they are supported by the government and nongovernmental organizations
- Analyze the effectiveness of the role and responsibilities of management and professionals to develop community networks for educational and industrial organisations through engaging in interviews, focus group session etc.
- Demonstrate their understanding of principals and methods of engaging in networking opportunities via conducting field visits and surveys
- Organize workshops and trainings for improving employability skills of the service users that will help them to get into labour market

5. Assessment

Suggested Assignments

Case Study

3500 – 4000 words case study based on the *rational, benefits* and *implications* of developing community networks. The case study should critically reflect on your theoretical and practical learning, understanding and experiences shared throughout the course.

Report

Based on their networking visits, students should write 2000 words report/s on educational, industrial and non-profit community development networks exploring the function, job roles and strategies to strengthen the collaborative working opportunities.

Seminar

During the course, each student will conduct 1-hour seminar on career related topics of their specific interest area (educational/workplace). The assessment of these seminars will be focused on the *networking strategies, collaborative working skills* and *maintaining effective relationship* with other organizations of mutual interest.
