

## **PSY-207: Personality Theories II (3 CHs)**

**Prerequisite:** Personality Theories I (PSY-233)

### **Course Description:**

This is the second of the two courses of personality theories. This course will focus on theories of personality and the role of important institutions in personality development and personality assessment. Students will be able critically evaluate theories, role of social and cultural factors in personality development.
