(GPP 826) Dynamics of Income Inequality and Poverty

Against the backdrop of economic crises, fiscal imbalances and persistent

unemployment, rising income inequality and poverty have become some of the key

challenges for nations around the world. The purpose of this course is to critically and

empirically analyze income inequality and poverty with a focus on measurement,

development, and public policy responses. This course will introduce students to the

structure, development and form of inequality and poverty in a cross-national and

longitudinal perspective. It will analyze how inequality and poverty affects policy

preferences and political behavior. It will also shed light on the role of social stratification

and its effect on income inequality and poverty.
