(GPP 824) Regionalism and Regional Integration

Pre-Requisites: None

**Course Description** 

The primary aim of this course is to impart an understanding of the twin phenomena of

regionalism and regional integration to the students. It will attempt to define and explain

the rise of regionalism, its evolution in different historical contexts and will try to forecast

its future in the emerging world order. It will elucidate the movements towards regional

integration with the help of functional and neo-functional perspectives. It will also

attempt to compare regionalism and regional integration movements in Europe and

South Asia. SAARC will be used as a case study to understand both the potential and

the limitations of the ongoing phenomena of regionalism in South Asia.

**Course Content** 

Definitions and meaning of regionalism, regional integration; Functional and neo-

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functional perspectives on regional integration; European model of regional integration; Antecedents and pre-requisites of regional integration. Interdependence, globalization and emergence of regional economic blocks; impediments to the growth of regional integration in South Asia; role of trade, investment, pipelines; BRI and CPEC; Role of SAARC.
