Foreign Policy of Pakistan –IR, 813 (Elective Course)

Course Description: Amongst Pakistan's main policies, foreign policy figures are a top priority. Since its simultaneous birth and independence in 1947, due to a set of reasons, including its survival and state-building, Pakistan's foreign policy has been at the forefront of the strategic thinking of the country's leadership. Given that Pakistan initiated her life as an independent nation at the crossroads of important international political events, such as the Cold War and decolonization, together with a problematic neighborhood (east and west), foreign policy encountered challenging moments that impacted the very construction of Pakistan as an independent country. The purpose of this course is to understand Pakistan's background of foreign policy in proper reference to context. Moreover, the students will be taught about the main determinants, guiding principles, desired and acquired objectives in the age of competing national interest of the state and also taught Pakistan's relations with various countries, its role in selected regional and international organizations, its policy and strategy towards non-state actors will be analyzed. Furthermore, Pakistan's foreign policy toward various regional and global issues will be discussed.

<u>Course Objectives</u>: This course aims not only to revisit the principal challenges Pakistan's foreign policy has encountered in relations with different regional and international actors but also to provide the students with an in-depth knowledge of how foreign policy operates in Pakistan and how it impacts the country not only in the international realm but also in the domestic one.

Learning Outcome: By the end of the semester term, students are expected to have gained core knowledge concerning Pakistan's foreign policy, thus being able to:

- 1. Critically evaluate the importance of foreign policy as one of the leading national policies in Pakistan.
- 2. Appreciate the foreign policy of Pakistan within a frame of logical and rational explanations.
- 3. Appreciate the importance of history and geopolitics for the construction of Pakistan's foreign policy.
- 4. Critically evaluate the importance of foreign policy for Pakistan's own existence

5. Critically analyze and evaluate the main challenges for current and future scenarios on Pakistan's foreign policy.
