

(GPP 825) Sustainable Development: Theory, Research, and Policy

Pre-requisites: None

Learning objectives

This course provides a practical, policy-oriented review of the concept of sustainable development. The course aims to explore the research methods and policy design for effective way of achieving sustainable development.

Learning outcomes

After completing the course, students should be able to:

- Define the concept of sustainable development from a variety of perspectives.
- Explain how the idea of sustainability and development has changed through, history, and how policy has evolved in line with these changing conceptions.
- Discuss United Nations' efforts to structure and implement sustainable development internationally and locally.
- Apply sustainable development policy statements to current environmental and development issues, and analyze the effects of these policies.
- Critically examine current trends in sustainable development, and relate these to theories of globalization.
