PEACEKEEPING AND PEACEBUILDING

(PCS 805)

CHs: 3.0

1. **Course Objectives:** Peacekeeping missions have evolved over the years. Peacekeeping was originally the presence of the UN but now regionally blocs like AU are also performing peacekeeping duties. Peacekeepers are sent to a conflict zone with the Security Council mandate to ensure the security space that is important for humanitarian and peace-building spaces. In 1988, the UN Peacekeeping Forces were awarded the Nobel Peace Prize for Peace. This course examines UN's complex peacekeeping and peace-building operations since the early 1950s and how it has changed since the end of the Cold War.

2. Outcomes: Students should be able to

- a. Demonstrate analytical and systematic thinking about peacekeeping and peace-building; and
- Understand theoretical and policy debates surrounding peacekeeping and peace-building.

3. Contents

- a. Theories on the nature of conflict and types of peace operations;
- Survey of the major UN missions e.g. Somalia, Rwanda, Sierra Leone,
 DRC etc.:
- c. International legal basis for interventions by external actors, state interests, capacity, mandate, strategies, and obstacles;
- d. Politics of peacekeeping and peace-building;
- e. Relationship between peace-building and state-building;
- f. Normative debates on justice and ethics;
- g. Indigenous peace-building
- h. Cooperation and coordination with multiple actors, especially NGOs, regional organizations, donor agencies, and multinational coalitions.
- The motivation of South Asian countries to participate in peacekeeping operations.
